

**GATES COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS
REGULAR MEETING MINUTES
JUNE 6, 2012**

The Gates County Board of Commissioners met in Regular Session at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, June 6, 2012 in the main courtroom, 202 Court Street, Gatesville. Commissioners Twine, Jordan, Hora, Owens and Jernigan were present. Also present was County Manager, Toby Chappell.

A prayer and pledge of allegiance were led by Vice-Chairman Jordan.

Chairman Twine called the meeting to order.

Approval of Agenda

Chairman Twine stated the Agenda needed to be amended by the following: Section III. A. will also include a public hearing, the addition of Section III. F. Timmy Hedgepeth, Section V. F. Chairman Twine and Closed Session will be authorized by NC §143-318.11(a)(3)(4)(5).

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to approve the Agenda as amended. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

Approval of Minutes

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to approve the Minutes of May 2, 10, 14, 21 and 24 as amended. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

Commissioner Hora made a motion to approve the Board of Equalization and Review Minutes for April 30 and May 21 as presented. Commissioner Jordan seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

Citizens' Comments

Thomas Hill, Sunbury, stated the library will not be creating revenue therefore he is requesting the project be halted. He would like the library to be voted on at the November election. He would like to have a debate with Commissioner Jordan.

Commissioner Jordan stated the library has been voted on by the Board, funding has been secured, and ground broken.

Lulu Eure, Community Center Director, stated the County needs to fill the horticulturist position with Cooperative Extension which has been vacant for two (2) years.

Reggie Askew, Eure, stated he would like the horticulturist position filled and would like the County to increase the salary percentage from 24% to 30%.

Rick Morgan, Corapeake, stated he uses the livestock agent in correlation with the tri-county horticulturist position and would like the County to support this effort.

Ed Webb, Sheriff, discussed a budget concern.

Department Reports

Sandy Pittman, Finance Officer, presented a Grant Project Ordinance for the Albemarle Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan Grant.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to adopt the Grant Project Ordinance for execution of the Albemarle Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan Grant. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

The Grant Project Ordinance for the Albemarle Regional Hazard Mitigation Plan Grant reads as follows:

**COUNTY OF GATES
GRANT PROJECT ORDINANCE
ALBEMARLE REGIONAL HAZARD MITIGATION PLAN GRANT**

BE IT ORDAINED by the Gates County Board of Commissioners that pursuant to Section 13.2 of Chapter 159 of the North Carolina General Statutes, the following Project Ordinance is hereby adopted:

Section 1. The project authorized is to produce a regional (13 County) Hazard Mitigation plan. Each County will receive a copy of the Mitigation plan that will satisfy requirements as set by FEMA.

Section 2. The officers of this unit are hereby directed to proceed with the project within the terms of the agreements and documents related to same.

Section 3. The following revenue source is anticipated to be available to complete this project:

Section 4. The following amounts are appropriated for this project:

45-8180-199	Professional Services	\$ 70,000
	Total	\$ 70,000

Section 5. The Finance Officer is hereby directed to maintain within the Project Fund sufficient detailed accounting records to satisfy the requirements of all funding sources.

Section 6. The Finance Officer is directed to report the financial status of each project element on a monthly basis via regular written monthly reports.

Section 7. The Budget Officer is directed to include a detailed analysis of past and future costs and revenues on this capital project in every annual budget submission made to the Commissioners during the duration of the project.

Section 8. Copies of this Project Ordinance shall be furnished to the Clerk to the Board, Budget Officer, and Finance Officer for direction in carrying out this project.

Section 9. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 10. This ordinance shall become effective upon its adoption.

Mrs. Pittman presented Budget Amendments 67-70 and 72-75.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to approve Budget Amendments 67-70 and 72-75 as presented. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

Commissioner Hora made a motion to take \$5,000 from fund balance to pay for vehicle detailing for the Sheriff's Department. There was no second to the motion.

Chairman Twine stated Budget Amendment 71 will be held to be reviewed by the County Manager, Finance Officer and the Sheriff.

Mrs. Pittman presented USDA loan refinance information as requested by the Board.

Commissioner Hora made a motion to hold this matter until he can recalculate the return. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

Commissioner Jernigan made a motion to open the Public Hearing on the Proposed 2012-2013 Budget Ordinance. Commissioner Jordan seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

With no public comment Commissioner Jordan made a motion to close the Public Hearing on the Proposed 2012-2013 Budget Ordinance. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

After Board discussion, it was requested the amount in Section 6.a. of the Proposed 2012-2013 Budget Ordinance be changed to \$1,000.

Renee McGinnis, Tax Administrator, presented the May 2012 Tax Collector's Report. She also requested clarification from the Board regarding housing grant recipients and permitting when there are delinquent taxes.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to waive the delinquent tax requirement for permitting for the four (4) residents who have been awarded housing grants; this does not prevent County foreclosure in the case where it exceeds the required limits. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

Patrice Lassiter, GITS Director, presented the FY 2013 Rural Operating Assistance Program Funds Grant Application (ROAP).

Commissioner Jernigan made a motion to open the Public Hearing for the FY 2013 Rural Operating Assistance Funds Grant Application (ROAP) for GITS. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

With no public comment Commissioner Hora made a motion to close the Public Hearing for the ROAP Application for GITS. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to approve the ROAP Grant Application as presented. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

Reba Green-Holley, Cooperative Extension Director, presented the Growing Gates Final Report. She also requested \$250 in support for signage for the Rosenwald School.

Commissioner Hora made a motion to allocate \$250 for signage for the Rosenwald School. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

Mrs. Green-Holley presented a Request for Surplus and Disposition of Assets.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to approve the Request for Surplus Assets as presented. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

Toby Chappell, County Manager, notified the Board of four (4) vacancies on the Board of Adjustment. Appointments can be made at the next meeting.

Timmy Hedgepeth, Water Department Supervisor, presented the changes to the Rules and Regulations to the Gates County Water System.

After discussion Commissioner Jordan made a motion to update the Rules and Regulations to the Gates County Water System to reflect the Public Works Department will bring service to the property of the customer. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

The Rules and Regulations to the Gates County Water System read as follows:

**RULES AND REGULATIONS OF
GATES COUNTY WATER SYSTEM**

GATESVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA

I. CLASSIFICATION OF SERVICE:

All services are classified under one category to include residential, schools, churches, and commercial users.

II. RATE SCHEDULE AND TAP-ON FEES:

A. Rate Schedule:

First	1 st 1,000 gallons @ \$10.00
Next	Each 1,000 gallons after @ \$3.00

(2) Trailer Courts and Multi-dwelling units served through one meter. "Trailer Court" shall mean any rental or sale of trailer spaces or trailers being used for any purpose. These installations shall be billed as per the County's regular published rates or \$10.00 per user, per month, whichever is greater.

(3) Trailer Court and multi-dwelling water service size to be required:

- a. 3/4" Service----- 1 Trailer
 1" Service----- 2-5 Trailers
 2" Service----- 6-20 Trailers

b. Cost of service to be paid by owner.

B. Tap-On Fees:

(1) Effective April 5, 1999 Tap-on Fees are as follows:

- a. For one 3/4" Service----\$ 750.00
 b. For one 1" Service-----\$1,000.00
 c. For one 1 1/2" Service---\$2,000.00
 d. For one 2" Service----\$2,000.00 (Applicant is responsible for engineering cost and submittal to NCDNR)

C. Impact Fee:

- a. \$1,000.00 / REU
(REU = Residential Equivalent Unit)
(1 REU = 4,000 Gallons)

III. APPLICATION FOR SERVICE:

- A. Service will be supplied only to those who have made application and have paid the tap-on fee and impact fee in full.
- B. The Consumer will complete the application form for service, in person, at the County billing office. At this time, all fees must be paid in full in order to proceed.
- C. The County may reject any application for service not available under a standard rate or which involves excessive service cost, or which may affect the supply of service to other customers or for other good and sufficient reasons.
- D. The County may reject any application for service when the applicant is delinquent in payment of bills incurred for service previously supplied at any location, provided that when the owner of the premises has been served water and has not paid for the same, the County shall not be required to render service to anyone at said location where the water was used, until said water bill has been paid.
- E. For violation of any of the provisions of these rules relating to application for service, the County may at the expiration of 15 days after mailing a written notice to the last known address of the Consumer, remove the meter and discontinue service. Where the meter is thereafter re-installed, the Consumer shall first pay to the County a re-installation charge of \$25.00

IV. INITIAL OR MINIMUM CHARGE:

- A. The initial or minimum charge, as provided in the rate schedule, shall be made for each meter installed, regardless of location. Each meter requires a separate meter reading sheet, and each meter reading sheet shall cover a separate and individual account.
- B. In resort areas where service is furnished to a consumer during certain months only, the minimum charge per service for the period of non-use shall be the regular minimum as set out in the published rates of the County.
- C. Water furnished for a given lot shall be used on that lot only. Each consumer's service must be separately metered at a single delivery and metering point. Each commercial unit and each storeroom or stall used for business purposes shall have a separate meter. All Commercial use including storerooms and stalls for business purposes shall be metered separately from any residential use and vice versa, whether now in service or to be installed in the future.

V. COUNTY'S RESPONSIBILITY AND LIABILITY:

- A. The County shall run a service line from its distribution line to the property line where the distribution line runs immediately adjacent and parallel to the property to be served, and for which a tap-on fee then in effect for each size of meter will be charged.
- B. The County may install its meter at the property line or, at the County's option, on the Consumer's property or in a location mutually agreed upon.
- C. When two or more meters are to be installed on the same premises for different consumers, they shall be closely grouped and clearly designated to which consumer it applies.

- D. The County does not assume the responsibility of inspecting the Consumer's piping or apparatus and will not be responsible therefore.
- E. The County reserves the right to refuse service unless the Consumer's lines or piping are installed in such manner as to prevent cross-connections or backflow.
- F. The County shall not be liable for damage of any kind whatsoever resulting from water or the use of water on the Consumer's premises, unless such damage results directly from negligence on the part of the County. The County shall not be responsible for any damage done by or resulting from any defect in the piping, fixtures, or appliances on the Consumer's premises. The County shall not be responsible for negligence of third persons or forces beyond the control of the County resulting in any interruption of service.
- G. Under normal conditions, the consumer will be notified of any anticipated interruption of service.

VI. CONSUMERS RESPONSIBILITY:

- A. Piping on the Consumer's premises must be so arranged that the connections are conveniently located with respect to the County's lines or mains.
- B. If the Consumer's piping on Consumer's premises is so arranged that the County is called upon to provide additional meters, each place of metering will be considered as a separate and individual account.
- C. Where meter is placed on premises of a consumer, a suitable place shall be provided by consumer for placing such meter, unobstructed and accessible at all times to the meter reader.
- D. The Consumer shall furnish and maintain a private cut- off valve on the Consumer's side of the meter; the County to provide a like valve on the County's side of such meter.
- E. The Consumer's piping and apparatus shall be installed and maintained by the Consumer at the Consumer's expense in a safe and efficient manner and in accordance with the County's rules and in full compliance with the sanitary regulations of the State Board of Health.
- F. The Consumer shall guarantee proper protection for the County's property placed on the Consumer's premises and shall permit access to it only by authorized representatives of the County.
- G. In the event that any loss or damage to the property of the County or any accident or injury to persons or property is caused by or results from the negligence or wrongful act of the Consumer, his agents, or employees, the cost of the necessary repairs or replacements shall be paid by the Consumer to the County; and any liability otherwise resulting shall be assumed by the Consumer.
- H. The amount of such loss or damage or the cost of repairs shall be added to the Consumer's bill; and if not paid, service may be discontinued by the County.
- I. It shall be the consumers responsibility to notify the County Water Department before allowing any flow test on a sprinkler system.
- J. Fire Department personnel shall maintain positive pressure on the county system at all times during high volume activities. By allowing fire fighting connections the county does not guarantee in any manner the availability of water for fire protection purposes.

VII. EXTENSIONS TO MAINS AND SERVICES:

- A. The County may construct extensions to its water lines to points within its service area but the County shall not be required to make such installations

unless the Consumer makes application for service and advances to the County the entire cost of the installation.

- B. All line extensions shall be evidenced by contract signed by the County and the person advancing funds for said extension, but each contract shall be null and void unless approved by the County Board of Commissioners.
- C. No refund shall be made from any revenue received from any lines leading up to or beyond the particular line extension covered by contract.
- D. It is understood that the County may, at its option, at any time within the one-year period refund, in full, the difference between the amount that has already been refunded and the amount deposited.
- E. Water distribution lines to serve undeveloped subdivisions will be handled as follows:
 - (1) The developer will submit plans for review and approval by the County, its engineer and the State Board of Health.
 - (2) The developer will install the lines in accordance with the approved plans.
 - (3) Upon completion of the new extension, the developer will deed the complete facility, to include all rights-of-ways, easements, permits, franchises and authorizations or other instruments needed, for the operation and maintenance of the facility, to the County. The County will not reimburse the developer for the extension.

**Water Main Extension Policy
(Less Than 1000 Feet)**

This policy is NOT for the use of subdivisions, sub dividers or new road construction.

Qualifying Criteria

- The existing water system must be able to support the proposed water main extension. (Which will be determined by the Utility's engineering firm)
- The proposed water main extension site must be on a state owned and state maintained right of way.
- An approved, licensed contractor must be used for the duration of the water main construction project.
- All materials used in the project must be preapproved by the county's utility director and the county's engineering firm.

Policy Procedure

- Contact the public utility director and provide the following information; the location, total distance, and number of anticipated water meter taps.
- The utility director will take the above information and conduct a feasibility study and compile a complete cost for the proposed water main extension, then report back to the inquiring party with the total cost and feasibility of the water main extension. At this time, the utility director will explain the cost sharing system. (Listed in appendix A)
- If the water system can handle the proposed water main extension, the inquiring party must then hire the utility's engineering firm to develop plans and blue prints for the water main extension. (The cost of the engineering firm will be the inquiring party's responsibility.)
- After the engineered plans have been completed, they must be submitted to the regional and state North Carolina Department of Environment & Natural Resources (NCDENR) office for approval and a project number. (The submittal of the plans will be completed by the utility director.)
- After NCDENR's approval, the approved licensed contractor can proceed with acquiring the needed permits from the Gates County Building & Inspection's office. (Permit fees will be waived)
- After permits have been acquired, construction of the water main extension may begin by the approved licensed contractor. The entire construction process will be monitored by the utility director for compliance with local, state, and federal rules and regulations.
- Upon completion of construction, the new water main must be pressure tested and chlorinated for 24 hours. Then a bacteriological sample shall be collected and sent to a

certified lab for analysis. The water analysis must come back negative and submitted to NCDENR before the new main can be activated for service.

Appendix A

Cost Sharing and Financial Responsibility

* Cost sharing will be calculated based on a two year return of investment.

-The Engineering fee for the plans will be the inquiring party's responsibility and is not included in the cost sharing.

-All expenses with the exception of the engineering fees will be entered into the cost sharing formula.

- All tap on fees for the proposed water main extension must be paid prior to the start of construction.

- \$300.00 of each tap on fee will be removed from the total cost of the main extension project, therefore reducing the total cost to the inquiring party or party's total expense for the project.

-At the completion of the water main extension, all new connections will start to receive a water bill and must keep their account or accounts active for a minimum of two years. By keeping the accounts active, an additional \$250.00 per tap will be removed from the inquiring party or party's total expense for the extension. If the account becomes delinquent at any time during the two year time period, the service will be discontinued and will not be reconnected until the \$250.00 discount has been reimbursed to the Public Utility.

-After the cost sharing figures have been calculated, the inquiring party or party's will pay the Public Utility Department their portion of the expenses or the financial equivalents and then the public utility will oversee the financing of the water main extension.

Cost Share Example

Example extension site information: 1,000 feet of four inch water main with one 4" valve and one blow off hydrant. There will be 6 new water taps as the result of this extension.

Note Engineering fee is not included in these figures.

Total water main extension cost: \$8,500.00

Total discount from Tap on fees: \$300.00/tap = \$1,800.00 discount

Total discount from minimum payments/tap = \$1,500.00 discount

Total discount for this project would be \$3,300.00

Total owed to the Public Utility by the inquiring party or party's would be \$5,200.00

VIII. ACCESS TO PREMISES:

A. Duly authorized agents of the County shall have access, at all reasonable hours, to the premises of the Consumer for the purpose of installing or removing County property, inspecting piping, reading or testing meters or for any other purpose in connection with the County's service and facilities.

B. Each consumer shall grant or convey, or shall cause to be granted or conveyed, to the County, a perpetual easement and right of way across any property owned or controlled by the Consumer wherever said perpetual easement and right-of-way is necessary for the County water facilities and lines, so as to be able to furnish service to the consumer.

IX. CHANGE OF OCCUPANCY:

A. Not less than three days notice must be given in person or in writing, at the County's office, to discontinue service or to change occupancy.

B. The outgoing party shall be responsible for all water consumed up to the time of departure or the time specified for departure, whichever period is longest.

X. BILLING - COLLECTING:

A. Bills for water will be figures in accordance with the County's published rate schedule then in effect and will be based on the amount consumed for the period covered by the meter readings.

B. Charge for service commences when meter installed, whether used or not.

- C. Readings from different meters will not be combined for billing, irrespective of the fact that said meters may be for the same or different premises, or for the same or different consumers, or for the same or different services.
- D. Bills are due when rendered and become delinquent 15 days thereafter whereupon a penalty of 10% will be added; and if not paid in 15 additional days, service may be discontinued by the County.
- E. Failure to receive bills or notices shall not prevent such bills from becoming delinquent or relieve the Consumer from payment.
- F. The county will make reasonable efforts to contact the consumer prior to disconnecting service, however failure to establish contact will not negate or limit the county's authority to discontinue serve for non-payment (as described under Section X) or for other reasons outlined under Section XI. The reasonable efforts referenced above can include, but are not limited to, phone calls, notices delivered by county personnel, and/or door hangers. At the time service is disconnected county personnel will attempt to make contact with the occupant of the structure and if unsuccessful will leave, in a prominent place, a notice indicting the disconnection and the process to follow for reconnection. County personnel will make every reasonable effort to disconnect service on Monday through Thursday in an effort to minimize inconvenience to the customer in the rare incidence of human error on the County's part.

Employees will not wait to disconnect service while the citizen goes to pay their bill.

Employees will not receive money at the scene; payment will have to be made through the water collections office.

XI. SUSPENSION OF SERVICE:

- A. Upon discontinuance of service for nonpayment of bills, the County may proceed to collect the amount due in the usual way provided by law for the collection of debts.
- B. Service discontinued for nonpayment of bills will be restored only after bills are paid in full, and a service charge of \$25.00 is paid for each meter reconnected.
- C. The County reserves the right to discontinue its service without notice for the following additional reasons:
 - (1) To prevent fraud or abuse.
 - (2) Consumer willfull disregard of the County's rules.
 - (3) Emergency repairs.
 - (4) Insufficiency of supply due to circumstances beyond the County's control.
 - (5) Legal processes.
 - (6) Direction of public authorities.
 - (7) Strike, riot, fire, flood, accident or any unavoidable cause.
- D. The County may, in addition to persecution by law, permanently refuse service to any consumer who tampers with a meter or other measuring device.

XII. COMPLAINTS - ADJUSTMENTS:

- A. If the Consumer believes his bill to be in error, he shall present his claim, in person, at the county office before the bill becomes delinquent.

Such claim if made after the bill has become delinquent shall not be effective in preventing discontinuance of service, as heretofore provided. The consumer may pay such bill under protest and said payment shall not prejudice his claim.

- B. The County will make special meter readings at the request of the Consumer for a fee of \$5.00, paid in advance, provided, however, that if such reading disclosed that the meter was overread, no charge will be made.
- C. Meters will be tested at the request of the Consumer upon payment to the County of \$15.00, paid in advance, provided, however, that if the meter is found to over-register beyond 5 per cent of the correct volume no charge will be made.
- D. If the seal of a meter is broken by other than the County's representative or if the meter fails to register correctly or is stopped for any cause, the Consumer shall pay an amount estimated from the record of his previous bills and/or from other proper data.

XIII. ABRIDGEMENT OF MODIFICATION OF RULES:

- A. No promise, agreement or representation of any employee of the County shall be binding upon the County except as it shall have been agreed upon in writing, signed and accepted by the acknowledged officers of the County.
- B. No modification of rates or any of the rules and regulations shall be made by any agent of the County.

XIV. ADOPTION OF RULES:

Until further order of the Board of Commissioners of this County, the rules and regulations as the same are hereinabove set out and hereby adopted as of the date hereof to become effective on and after July 01, 2012

XV. AMENDMENTS

- A. Effective July 7, 1980 the fee for replacement of damaged water meter boxes will be \$15.00.
- B. Effective August 4, 1980 meter boxes will be removed 90 days after water service is discontinued because of nonpayment of bills. After meter boxes are removed, water service can be restored by making application for new service and paying associated fees therewith.
- C. Effective June 1, 1981 unauthorized use of fire hydrants is prohibited.
- D. Effective July 1, 2012 Tap-on Fees are as follows:
 - a. For one 3/4" Service----\$ 750.00
 - b. For one 1" Service-----\$1,000.00
 - c. For one 1 1/2" Service---\$2,000.00
 - d. For one 2" Service-----\$2,000.00
- E. Revised Rates

\$10.00 First 1,000 gallons minimum
 \$3.00 each additional 1,000 gallons

C. Impact Fee:

- a. \$1,000.00 / REU
 (REU = Residential Equivalent Unit)
 (1 REU = 4,000 Gallons)

F. ADJUSTMENTS FOR CONCEALED LEAKS

On a concealed leak in the customers piping, an adjustment may be made under the following conditions.

1. The leak must be a concealed leak. A commode tank shutoff valve, water heater pressure relief valve, outside and inside faucets, exposed piping etc. SHALL NOT be considered a concealed leak.
2. No adjustments will be made unless the gallons billed are at least twice the highest monthly billing in the previous twelve (12) months.
3. Only one adjustment shall be made in a twelve (12) month period.
4. When the Water Department discovers that a leak exists, and the owner is notified of same, the owner shall take immediate steps within fifteen (15) days to correct the situation. Undue delay by the owner shall cause forfeiture of benefits of adjustment.
5. No adjustment will be made without and investigation and approval from the Gates County Water Supervisor that the leak was concealed and has been repaired.
6. After the above requirements have been met, the water bill will be adjusted downward to the average of the last twelve months.

Old Business

Mr. Chappell stated two applications have been received for the two (2) vacancies on the Northeast Workforce Development Board. The Clerk will follow-up with appropriate forms for the applicants and the Workforce Development Board.

New Business

Gretchen Byrum, NCDOT District Engineer, presented the 2012-2013 Secondary Roads Construction Program.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to adopt the Resolution for the Secondary Roads Improvement Program for 2012-2013. Commissioner Hora seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

The Resolution for the Secondary Roads Improvement Program for 2012-2013 reads as follows:

WHEREAS, the Savage Road will be paved from SR 1302 to 1.70 miles East (\$50,000), and

WHEREAS, paved road improvements totaling \$265,000 have been scheduled for Sandy Cross Road from NC 32 to SR 1002 (\$165,000), Acorn Hill Road from SR 1413 to US 158 (\$50,000) and various pavement preservation activities on secondary roads (\$50,000), and

WHEREAS, unpaved road spot improvements have been scheduled (\$75,000), and

WHEREAS, funds have been reserved for surveying, right of way acquisition, road additions, contingencies, departmental overhead, overdrafts, and paving entrances to certified fire departments, rescue squads, etc. (\$29,061.12).

NOW, THEREFORE, the Gates County Board of Commissioners approves the 2012-2013 Secondary Roads Construction Program as submitted by North Carolina Department of Transportation.


