

**GATES COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS
REGULAR MEETING MINUTES
JUNE 4, 2014**

The Gates County Board of Commissioners met in Regular Session at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, June 4, 2014 in the Main Court Room, 202 Court Street, Gatesville. Commissioners Jordan, Owens, Jernigan, Hofler, and Felton were present. Also present was Interim County Manager, Kenneth Windley.

Chairman Jordan led in prayer and the pledge of allegiance.

Chairman Jordan called the meeting to order.

Approval of Minutes

Commissioner Owens made a motion to approve the minutes as modified for May 5, 2014, May 7, 2014, May 12, 2014 and May 19, 2014. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion, motion carried unanimously.

Approval of Agenda

Chairman Jordan stated that the agenda needs to be amended to reschedule the 2014-2015 Budget Public Hearing and Adoption under item VI to the June 16th meeting at 7 p.m..

Commissioner Hofler made a motion to reschedule the budget public hearing to be held on June 16th at 7 p.m.. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion, motion carried unanimously.

Chairman Jordan stated that agenda item VIII 9 needs to be modified to include revised budget amendment 53 and 53A.

Commissioner Jernigan made a motion to approve the agenda as amended. Commissioner Hofler seconded the motion, motion passed without opposition.

Delegations – Unannounced

Earl Rountree, Sunbury, stated that he has recently been to the Chowan and Pasquotank County Commissioner meetings. Years ago the counties in the North East really worked together and shared services as much as possible and for the most part everyone got along well. Things have changed now and it has become very difficult to work together. Mr. Rountree stated that he is here to talk about the funding for the DA and Public Defender. What happened was at some point in time the 6 of the 7 counties in the 1st district has worked together to provide funding for the office and furnishing. There is no state law on who is responsible for these costs and no one really knows what would happen if Pasquotank quit funding the office. There was a gentleman's agreement that was reached between all of the counties to fund the office and Gates County cost was around \$15,000. Last year the Dailey Advance wrote a story that Gates County did not pay their \$15,000, later in the article you found out that Chowan and Currituck did not pay theirs either. Last year I was here defending the County Manager but the fact is that we did go back on our word. This is something that we need to work out with these counties. The District Attorney's office has always been in Pasquotank, it is the biggest city and in the center of the district. The County Manager in Chowan was actually the one that went about getting this started. Mr. Rountree asked Mr. Windley if he received a letter from Mr. Bunch, Mr. Windley stated that we received it on Monday. Mr. Rountree stated that his proposal is if Chowan and Currituck is not going to pay theirs then we don't need to pay ours. There needs to be a joint meeting with the commissioners and managers of all of the counties. Mr. Rountree stated that his proposal would be to instruct the County Manager to send Rodney Bunch a letter stating that Gates County will pay their share if all of the other counties pay theirs but we should not pay ours if the others are not going to get on board.

Chairman Jordan stated that this issue did come up in the fall and the Board felt that we provide a space that is adequate.

Mr. Rountree stated that in reality the office we provide is just utilized on court day it is not a main office that host law books, computers, conference space and other amenities. You have to have space where assistant DA's and administrative staff can all work together.

Renee Nicholson, Shiip Representative Cooperative Extension Office, stated that she is the volunteer Shiip representative at the extension office. Shiip stands for Senior Health Insurance Information Program and her duty through Shiip is to provide help for senior citizens as well as the disabled by helping them enroll in the prescription drug plan known as Medicare Part D. Medicare Part D has a variety of prescription drug plans that are offered to those who qualify. She informed the Board about the new service that Shiip has to offer for Medicare Part D. This service is called Extra Help or LIS which stands for Low-income Subsidy. LIS helps lower the cost of prescription drug premiums, deductibles and coinsurance and if qualified for the full LIS, there will be no premiums and deductibles. The copay can range from \$2.65-\$6.60. Anyone who is enrolled in Medicare, either because of age or disability, and living with limited income and assets can apply for LIS. Eligibility guidelines for LIS are based on income and assets and may be subject to change from year to year. All interested seniors and disabled that are enrolled in Medicare Part D can contact Ms. Nicholson at the Gates County Extension Office 252 357-1400.

Commissioner Owens asked if there have been any seminars held. Ms. Nicholson stated that so far they are only two months into the program and no seminars have been held yet. Information has been given out and posted at the Community Center and the Millpond, brochures have been handed out to churches and they are in the process of scheduling senior homes and church programs.

Commissioner Hofler asked if DSS will send people to see Ms. Nicholson. Ms. Nicholson stated that DSS has been referring people to her for additional help, the individual is able to go online and register themselves but often times they need someone to sit and give them a little extra help.

Chairman Jordan recommended contacting Mr. Cal Bryant with the newspaper to help spread the word.

Dr. Barry Williams, Superintendent, stated that the budget released by the NC Senate includes a lot of things and preliminary estimates of the budget impact 740,000 teacher assistants, 1,000 transportation employees, 1,000 central office workers and hiring 788 additional early grade teachers as class size increases. The senate proposal includes devastating cuts that are going to be harmful to our students. It calls for a cut of over \$330 million that will negatively impact students. I am here today to say thank you very much for your commitment to our students and our schools and you do help out the schools and show that you feel it is important.

Delegations – Announced

Adrienne Bradley, Juvenile Crime Prevention Council Chairman, presented to the Board the JCPC Funding Plan. Ms. Bradley explained that this is her annual visit to explain what the JCPC funds are used for. The JCPC Funding Plan shows that Gates County is receiving \$61,299 from the NC Department of Public Safety for juvenile crime prevention services. The Alternatives For Youth Program is located within Gates County School System and provides a in-kind match. The other programs Genesis and Restitution are based out of Cooperative Extension and they provide an in-kind match of a little over \$5,700. We ask that you approve the JCPC county funding plan today. Also there is a certification form that is completed each year and covers what the membership is, how often we meet, if we have by-laws and other things. We do ask for a signature from the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners, we do not have to have approval we just need a signature. Ms. Bradley shared a few highlights from the 2014-2015 County Plan and a description of the Alternatives For Youth Program, Genesis Program, and Restitution Program.

Commissioner Hofler asked how many students are involved in each of the programs. Ms. Bradley stated that the Genesis program has about 50 to 60 students, the Alternatives for Youth Program has about 10 students that the counselor works one on one with.

Commissioner Owens asked if the contribution from the Extension office is from the entire office or a specific individual. Ms. Bradley stated that Mr. Donald Hendrix is the gentleman that provides assistance to the Genesis program and I believe that he is full time.

Commissioner Hofler made the motion to authorize the signature on the JCPC certification document. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion, motion passed without opposition.

Administrative Reports

Ken Windley, Interim County Manager, presented the May County Manager's Report on page 39 and 40 of the agenda. Mr. Windley stated that we have been working with the owners of the Old Sunbury School on a grant pre-application, full application and site visit. The grant is worth \$60,000, based on the number of jobs created, and can be used toward construction cost. I met with Al Carey on May 13th to develop a list of eleven things to be on the protective covenants. I have worked with Municipal Engineering to develop the first portion of the contract to evaluate the property for the spray irrigation and treatment plant. This was approved on May 19. On May 13th I met with the Albemarle Rural Planning Organization in Gates County to review the Transportation Survey that will be going out with the next water billing. I will keep you informed of the results. They also reviewed population projections from the Office of State Budget and Management. There projections showed no population increase for Gates County to 2040. One new project can turn that around, however. After the Commissioners reviewed the county budget I met with department heads to explain their individual budgets. As time allows I am working on zoning amendments and water policy changes over the past five years, plus issues with the subdivision ordinance. Subdivision Ordinance changes go to the Planning Board June 17. I am in the process of reviewing incentives that were proposed for Gates County and comparing them to other counties. For example, about 40 industries of various sizes came to Robeson County during my tenure. I continue to serve as County Planner and met with the Planning Board on May 20 to review a text amendment to the Zoning Ordinance. I met with the Technical Review Committee yesterday. The Technical Review Committee recommended about 11 or 12 changes to the subdivision ordinance that will go to the Planning Board.

Commissioner Owens stated that we had an elderly citizen in the county that had an unusual circumstance and their water was cut off. Ken and Tim were very helpful in resolving the situation and getting the water back on. Commissioner Owens asked if there was a way if we have someone that is on dialysis or someone that has a caregiver or even above a certain age that we could mark them, maybe with a letter at the end of the account, so that we make an extra effort to check on their payment prior to turning them off. Mr. Ken Windley stated that it is a modification that needs to take place and may need to be a modification in software. Commissioner Hofler stated that she knows that some places will have a next of kin that is notified if an elderly person does not pay.

Commissioner Hofler asked if the TRC meeting was a regular scheduled meeting. Mr. Windley stated that it was not a regularly scheduled meeting but they needed to go ahead and receive information before it could go before the Planning Board. Commissioner Hofler asked if the meeting had to be publicized; Mr. Windley stated that he believes the meeting was publicized and will check to make sure it was. Chairman Jordan stated that in accordance to the NC General Statutes, boards that are extensions of or authorized by the County Commissioners may not be required to post advertisements. We need to look at the General Statutes to make sure that there is a requirement for that Board to advertise its meetings. Chairman Jordan stated that he isn't sure that we have ever really advertised the TRC meetings. Commissioner Hofler stated that in the zoning ordinance it states something about regular scheduled meetings are held at a certain time. Mr. Windley stated that we have to make notifications not necessarily advertise the meeting.

There were no other questions for the County Manager.

Chairman Jordan asked Ms. Pittman why the unemployment insurance line item is over for several departments. Ms. Pittman stated that this was the first year of the new system which requires us to pay 1% of salaries up front and it sits in an account. This year we

had to pay the 1% for 2013, the 1% for 2014 in January and then they sent out bills for the previous year. We estimated an increase but we did not estimate high enough. There were two and three departments that not only had to pay the 1% twice but also had to pay an additional bill.

Commissioner Owens asked if the 2014-2015 budget reflects these changes. Ms. Pittman stated that in 2014-2015 we hope to only have to pay the 1% once not twice.

Mrs. Renee McGinnis, Tax Administrator, presented the collectors report to the Board. We have recently requested an update from Zacchaeus Legal Services and where they stand as far as complaints being filed. We will email a copy of that spreadsheet out to the Board. Mrs. McGinnis provided an overview of one of the budget amendments that is up for review in regards to the business personal property audit. We are scheduled to send out the tax bills on July 15th.

Mrs. McGinnis presented a request for tax refund for Glendon Goodman and Iris Goodman in the amount of 101.30 to the Board.

Commissioner Felton made a motion to approve the tax refund for Glendon Goodman and Iris Goodman for \$101.30. Commissioner Hofler seconded the motion, motion passed unanimously.

Chairman Jordan asked about Travis Ellis. Mrs. McGinnis stated that it is slow; we have paid him a portion of the bill he sent, there were several accounts that we questioned the fee amount and asked for detailed listings for those accounts and have not received the information at this point.

There were no other departmental questions.

Ken Windley, Interim County Manager, presented to the Board an Agreement with Virginia Employment Commission. Mr. Windley stated that this is an information sharing agreement to make sure people are properly eligible to obtain services.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to adopt the ordinance and agreement with Virginia Employment Commission. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion, motion passed unanimously.

The Board reviewed the Memorandum of Agreement with the Gates County Chamber of Commerce.

Chairman Jordan stated that under section A there should be an item five that states that Gates County should not be held liable for any content on the webpage that may result in legal litigation. If legal litigation is filed in result of any content posted the County should be hold harmless.

Commissioner Owens would like to see the County Attorney review the document. The item will be tabled until the next meeting.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to table the memorandum of agreement with the Gates County Chamber of Commerce until the hold harmless statement can be added and the document can be reviewed by the attorney. Commissioner Hofler seconded the motion, motion passed without opposition.

Ms. Sandy Pittman, Finance Director, presented budget amendments 37, 38, 39, 41, 42, 43, 52, and 53.

Amendment 37 is to budget for the final EMPG payment. We received part of the money at the beginning of the year and then usually around May we get the final payment and never know what that amount is going to be. We always have to adjust budget at the end of the year. Amendment 38 is to amend the budget for the Medicaid transportation program which is fully reimbursable. The revenues and expenditures are grant funding and no county funding. Amendment 39 is the same but for the crisis intervention program with DSS and is reimbursable funds. Amendment 41 is a little larger, our projection for sales tax revenues have come in a little more than \$50,000 higher than we projected and we are trying to use these funds to fill in several shortfalls in the budget. Amendment 42 is to transfer an additional \$100,000 from the general fund and the water fund each to the wastewater project. We need to cover expenditures that we have already spent that we were expecting to receive grant funds for. We have not been able to draw down the grant funds yet so we need to transfer money over to cover the cost until we are able to receive the grant funds. Once we receive grant funds we can transfer these funds back to the general fund. Amendment 43 is for the generator switch grant project that has been going on for several year. We have received an additional grant to help cover cost associated with the project. There are no county funds associated just grant funds. Amendment 52 covers some additional revenues that we expect to receive and some laps salaries in the register of deeds line that we need to spend. These funds are needed to cover the radio system and Tyco Security capital improvement projects. Part of the radio purchase involves some funds that we hope to get from the sale of the concrete building in the back of the administration building but that will not take place by the end of the budget year.

Commissioner Felton asked if the radios could be funded out of the E911 Fund. Ms. Pittman stated no, they are not eligible. Some radios have been purchased out of that fund but these are not eligible.

Amendment 53 is to budget additional funds from the general fund and the water fund to cover additional costs that are estimated for the wastewater treatment facility project. According to Municipal Engineering we need an additional \$686,200 to finish the project. If you go to amendment 53a the amendment amends the project budget to show the money coming in and the reallocation and increases in the line items for the project budget. In the legal line we expect to spend about \$5,200 less than we budgeted. In the engineering line we expect to spend about \$68,300 less than we budgeted. The grant funding and administration line is being increased by \$19,500. The purchase of the land was originally included in the construction cost and did not have a line item, we have broken it out to show the \$200,000 for the land purchase. The advertising costs are expected to be less and we have reduced that line by \$6,800. The construction line will be increased by \$547,000.

Commissioner Felton stated that the \$686,200 is non-refundable money leaving the County. Ms. Pittman stated that at this time we do not have grant funds in place to reimburse the county. Municipal is looking for some additional grant funds that may be available but have not been secured yet.

Commissioner Owens clarified that none of the dollars for existing grants can be used. Ms. Pittman stated that those dollars have already been accounted for, these are additional dollars. We will not be able to recoup these dollars unless we receive additional grants.

Commissioner Hofler verified that construction cost have increased about half a million dollars. Ms. Pittman stated this is correct.

Commissioner Felton stated that the total cost to the county will be \$1,457,695.25 is county money that is nonrefundable. Ms. Pittman stated that is correct, those are the projected costs.

Ms. Pittman stated that she also included the estimated cost sheet provided by Municipal Services.

Chairman Jordan asked if the grants that we have will be able to utilize the funds to cover the construction cost. If we get a grant at the end or later it would still cover the

construction cost. Ms. Pittman stated that the overall total project cost we have \$2.15 million to cover the project and anything over that amount will be County dollars unless there are additional grants received. If we receive additional grants we would be able to pay them toward the additional cost that the County will pay.

Commissioner Felton clarified that the total estimated cost is \$3,607,695.25. Ms. Pittman stated that is correct.

Commissioner Owens asked if in working with Municipal to apply for additional grants we would mention dollars already spent. Mr. Windley stated that is correct and if it needed matching funds you would already have matching funds budgeted.

Commissioner Hofler asked to if we were going to do each amendment separate. Commissioner Owens stated that he would like to see 37-52 lumped together and 53 and 53A separate.

Commissioner Hofler made a motion to approve budget amendments 37, 38, 39, 41, 42, 43, and 52. Commissioner Felton seconded the motion, motion passed without opposition.

Chairman Jordan stated that budget amendment 53 covers the additional cost as a result of the acquired land purchase as well as the additional construction costs.

On 53A what we originally budgeted we are coming in less as well as advertising and legal that are coming in less. The land acquisition was something that we had talked about in the past and knew that it was going to be something that would come up and have to have provisions made.

Chairman Jordan stated we have 53 and 53A that need to be addressed to be able to go forward with the project.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to approve 53 and 53A. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion. Commissioners Jernigan, Owens, and Jordan voted in favor and Commissioner Hofler and Felton voted against. The motion passed by a majority vote of 3 to 2.

Earl Rountree, Sunbury, asked what the discussion about a \$3 million dollar is really about and exactly what the project is. Mr. Rountree asked the Chairman to explain the project and where the money is going.

Mr. Windley stated that he would be happy to meet with him after the meeting to bring him up to speed on the project.

Chairman Jordan stated that the County applied for over \$2 million dollars in grants to upgrade the wastewater treatment facility that we have that supports the commerce park development. Currently we have about \$2.5 million in grants and the engineering company projects a difference in costs and we have to have those costs covered in the budget before we move forward. Some things must be discussed in closed session and can't be public information.

Sherwood Eason, Gatesville, asked if we are talking about work that is to be completed or work that has already been completed that we owe for. Chairman Jordan stated that some of the work has been done and some work is to come. Mr. Eason asked how much of the projected cost will not be covered. Chairman Jordan stated that it is difficult to get into a public discussion about certain business costs until the project is completed. Mr. Eason stated that sometimes it is time to bail out on a project; businesses get in business to make money. For a business to thrive there has to be a population base. It has been a trend that people in Gates County leave the county to do their business and shopping. We have a few private businesses that have done things on their own and have made it work. If you have to subsidize a business so much they will fold once the subsidies run out. A couple of commissioners have inherited some things and some commissioners have left. Everyone hasn't always worked together and shared all information. The county manager needs to work with everyone and share all information; this has been an issue in the past. Mr. Eason stated that it is Gates County and not this person or that

person and who you like and who you don't. I don't know if Gates County will ever be able to recover from what is going on out at commerce. We are at a point now where people are paying inflated water bills to help fund these additional projects. If we don't have the money then the general fund has to be used. Sometimes it comes to the point where you have to bail out. Business people don't have to come here to find out about the county, they can find out our information on the internet and our population and that we are a bedroom community to VA. Hyde and Hertford County qualified for help from the State; they had the high side of the river and the railroads. We are in a place where we are always going to have problems attracting businesses.

Chairman Jordan stated that he recognizes that on the outside looking in it is difficult to see how things will work. The Board has to weigh the options of what to do and decide if it is going to be feasible. This has never been a project that is looked at as something that you move forward with no matter what. The Board has made considerations and every decision is not going to be one that everyone agrees with.

Commissioner Felton asked to address Mr. Eason. Commissioner Felton stated that he disagrees and feels that all information should be made public. On top of what has already been spent there has been another \$686,200 which brings the total up to over \$1 million to fund the private developer.

Chairman Jordan stated that we have two schools and a community center that is on the sewer system as well so it's not just for private development. Money has been put forward for phase I and if we don't go forward we are going to lose some grants and have to pay some others back. We could end up paying more for an incomplete project than for a complete project.

Commissioner Hofler stated that phase I will cover the schools, the library, community center, and the assisted living facility without phase II. Chairman Jordan stated that the issue is that we are at 80% capacity and the state law says that you have to have a contingency plan. To get the capacity that we have we had to go to the state and get them to approve the actual usage of the assisted living and not what the state recommends. Mr. Eason asked if the system we have now will not support the assisted living. Chairman Jordan stated that it would not without the exception that the State has made. The state has agreed to let the County use what the facility actually uses and not what the State Code recommends.

Commissioner Hofler asked if the County has contacted NCDENR in little Washington about how to improve the capacity of our Phase I system. Mr. Windley stated that the office in Washington has inspected and will not increase capacity anytime soon. We inherited a mess and are trying to clean it up now but they do not have any plans to increase capacity anytime soon.

Commissioner Comments

Commissioner Owens thanked citizens for attending and bringing up their points of interest and comments. On a one-to-one basis there are considerable questions that could be answered to help understand the project. You can visit with the County Manager to discuss the project and get answers to questions. There are always risk and hard decisions to make when it comes to doing something new and something different to try to change trends. The interest of all five parties up here is to do what is best for the County.

Commissioner Jernigan thanked everyone for attending and stated that Mr. Eason has a lot of good points. We have spent a lot of money on the projects and at times some of it has seemed to have been hidden. Commissioner Jernigan stated that he has stayed with the project because he thinks it is the right thing to do. He hopes that somewhere down the line it will be paying for itself and hopefully we will be able to receive some more grants to cover areas where I feel we have overspent. He feels that it is something that we need to move forward.

Commissioner Hofler thanked everyone for attending and said that we do need more open and frank discussions about the project. The lack of discussion is causing some of the issues that we are having today. I agree that we have to provide for the schools and the library but their amount of usage is minimum. I think that we could do something cheaper than going full blast through all of these phases. Also, every time you build something, the estimate is typically less than what you end up actually spending. We don't know what the cost of this project is going to be in the next months and next year. Mr. Windley has stated that sewer systems never make money; their best bet is to break even.

Commissioner Felton thanked everyone for attending and would love to see the court room filled for the discussion. As you have very openly seen today we have differences of opinion and that is why there are five people on the Board. I do appreciate everyone for coming.

Mr. Eason stated that a lot of big tax payers are getting concerned and we need to figure out a way to become more transparent with information and think about it in a way like you are investing your own money in the project.

Chairman Jordan thanked citizens for attending and Mr. Eason for his comments. The public has put us in office to make the best decisions for the county and we do diligently look at the issues and try to make the best decisions. I appreciate the Board's deliberations and thoughts but we do need to look at things not only short term but long term and evaluate all options. I do believe that the County will benefit from the decisions that are being made by the majority vote. There have been things in the past that have passed that did not pass by a majority vote that ended up being good for the County. Thank you all for coming.

Closed Session

Commissioner Owens made a motion to enter into closed session pursuant to NCGS 143-318.11 a (3) Legal, (4) Economic Development, (5) Real Estate (6) Personnel. Commissioner Jernigan seconded the motion, motion passed without opposition.

Commissioner Jernigan made a motion to exit closed session. Commissioner Hofler seconded the motion, motion carried without opposition.

Adjournment

Commissioner Felton made a motion to recess until 1p.m. on June 9, 2014. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion, motion passed without opposition.
