

**GATES COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS  
REGULAR MEETING MINUTES  
JULY 1, 2015**

The Gates County Board of Commissioners met in Regular Session at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, July 1, 2015 in the Main Court Room, 202 Court Street, Gatesville. Commissioners Hofler, Owens, Jordan, Felton and Freeman were present. Also present was County Manager, Natalie Rountree.

Commissioner Jordan led in prayer and the pledge of allegiance.

Chairman Hofler called the meeting to order.

**Approval of Minutes**

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to approve the minutes as presented for June 3, 2015. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion carried unanimously.

**Approval of Agenda**

Chairman Hofler stated the agenda needs to be adjusted to add a MESCO Update as item 8 under new business.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to approve the agenda as amended. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

**Administrative Reports**

Natalie Rountree, County Manager, presented the managers' report for May 22 to June 19, 2015. A report from Sass Conservation was received on June 3<sup>rd</sup>, the report as well as a statement from Jon Zellweger is included in your packet. This matter is on the agenda later during the meeting for discussion of how to proceed with repairs. Following passing of the budget on June 3<sup>rd</sup>, much of June was spent ensuring departments understood year end fiscal close-out, learning more about the historic work done on a senior center, and handling day to day issues. Ms. Rountree along with other Gates County Employees and Chair Hofler participated in the Disaster Preparedness meeting at Emergency Operations Center. Ms. Rountree also attended the Board of Elections meeting. On May 19<sup>th</sup> Chair Hofler gave a guided tour of the Historic Courthouse to Gatesville third graders. The tour concluded their year of learning about Gates County History. Chair Hofler, Commissioner Jordan, Albemarle Commission Executive Director Cathy Davison, Agency on Aging Director Laura Alvarico and Ms. Rountree met to discuss funding options and operational questions about a senior center on June 3<sup>rd</sup>. On June 12<sup>th</sup> Ms. Rountree attended the Adult and Aging Task Force meeting and the Essentials of Economic Development class in Rocky Mount on June 17<sup>th</sup> to gain a better understanding of economic development laws in North Carolina. Ms. Rountree announced that Helen Eure will begin work on July 6<sup>th</sup> as the County Director at the Cooperative Extension Office.

Commissioner Jordan asked for information regarding the Board of Elections Meeting. Ms. Rountree stated the majority of the information was discussed in closed session and an update will be provided to the Board in closed session today. Ms. Rountree shared the new appointments to the Board of Elections.

Commissioner Jordan talked about the Albemarle Commission getting in contact with the Southeast Virginia Aging Task Force to see if funds could be transferred between agencies. Commissioner Jordan stated he sent an email to Ms. Davison with the Albemarle Commission to see if contact had been made and has not received a response. Chair Hofler had contact with Ms. Davison who said she has made contact with the

agency but has not received a response yet due to staff being on vacation. Commissioner Owens stated he has been researching senior centers across the state and has found they differ drastically and some were funded and built by local philanthropist.

Kathy Lane, Tax Administrator, presented the collectors report to the Board. Overall compared to last year collection rate is higher. Zacchaeus Legal Service has collected a good amount of delinquent taxes. Ms. Lane stated there was approximately \$24,000 in lost revenue that has rolled off the books due to the 10 year general statute limitations. A good portion of the funds were automobile taxes. Commissioner Owens verified that the \$24,000 included interest and penalties. Ms. Lane stated she and Ms. Chavis have made door to door calls to try to understand the individual's situation and what the office can do to get them on a payment plan. Ms. Lane said it is a possibility that they may print a list each month of delinquent payments and make visits to help residents get things sorted before their property goes to foreclosure. Commissioner Owens stated when it comes to collections more often than not people are relieved when someone else addresses the situation and informs them of all of their options. When you are in that situation residents are faced with a burden and struggle with knowing and understanding their information and situation. Commissioner Owens asked about the Ellis accounts. Ms. Lane stated there are three accounts that remain with Ellis and one has begun service by publication. Ellis isn't as responsive as the office would like due to some of his other work. In years past there has been a lack of communication. The three accounts are vacant land parcels with multiple owners and total about \$5,200 including penalties and interest but does not include legal fees. Commissioner Owens asked if the attorney started the process prior to the ending of the 10 years does the 10 years still apply. Ms. Lane stated the 10 years still applies. Ms. Lane clarified the 10 year rule only drops off one year of delinquent taxes. If payments are made the payment is applied to the oldest year. The new tax software is still pending trial runs with the new server. The July tax bills will not be on target and there may be some calls from citizens, it is realistic that the bills will go out the second or third week of August.

Commissioner Jordan stated the Board of Equalization and Review will meet immediately following the adjournment of today's meeting.

Commissioner Owens stated the value of construction permitted in the month of May was just under one million dollars.

Commissioner Jordan asked the Planning Office for an update on the work being done to the Zoning Ordinance. Ms. Baptiste stated there were some legislative updates conducted in 2011 and 2012 that have never been recorded so the office has been going through and reviewing updates so it can go to the Planning Board and the Board of Commissioners for final approval.

Chairman Hofler shared some of the stats given to the Board about the children of Gates County.

Ms. Rountree announced the NCACC Annual Conference will be held in Pitt County in August and the early registration ends July 16<sup>th</sup>. Members of the Board need to let the staff know if they plan to attend.

There were no other departmental questions.

### **Old Business**

Ms. Rountree stated the report from Sass Conservation has been received and Clearscapes is interested in working with Sass Conservation. The report noted the need for soil testing but the County had it tested a few years ago and has received the report from Clearscapes. The soil testing was conducted out in the grassy area and not next to the building, there were also trees in the area. Mr. Andrus believes the soil testing needs to be conducted right next to the building especially along the west wing in the trenches. Ms. Sass also mentioned other structural issues on the east side that may be taking place and advised soil

testing be conducted on the east wing also. Chair Hofler asked who would conduct the soil testing. Ms. Rountree explained the County would have to follow the bid process to secure a company to conduct soil testing.

Commissioner Jordan explained all work on the building has been stopped and the soil testing seems to be vital to ensure that decisions can be made appropriately.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to move forward with the County Manager to submit a request for bids for soil testing on the east and west wings. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion, motion passed without opposition.

Commissioner Owens recommended we solicit opinions from Clearscapes and the contractor on firms with good reputations that would meet our needs and then we could reach out to these companies to submit a bid.

Commissioner Owens read the following:

**RESOLUTION REQUESTING THE NORTH CAROLINA GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO CHANGE THE REQUISITE FUNDING FORMULA TO INCREASE THE NUMBER OF ALLOTTED CLASSROOM TEACHERS' POSITIONS BY APPLYING THE FORMULA TO INDIVIDUAL SCHOOLS AND GRADES RATHER THAN DISTRICTWIDE AND FUND THESE POSITIONS BY THE CURRENT BUDGETED AMOUNT**

**WHEREAS**, the North Carolina General Assembly sets forth certain funding formulas for the Department of Public Instruction to apply when funding public education; and

**WHEREAS**, the State determines the number of teachers' positions allotted to each school district based upon the number of students in each grade. The State determines the student to teacher ratio as well. Currently, for kindergarten classes, the student to teacher ratio is 1/18. Thus, there must be one teacher for every 18 kindergarten students. The State takes the total number of kindergarteners in each school district and then applies the ratio to determine the allotted kindergarten teachers. Since the State applies the ratio in this manner, it appears that the individual school's needs for teachers' positions are often not met since the student counts vary from school to school. Take for instance four schools which have 25 kindergarten students in each school in a single school district. When you apply the State required student teacher ratio of 1/18 in this scenario, you will calculate a need for 8 teachers. However, when you use the formula the State uses, you would add all the kindergarten students into a single number equaling 100. Next, you would apply the student teacher ratio and divide 100 total kindergarteners by 18 students, which equal 5.5 teachers when 8 teachers are actually needed. This is an example of how the State's funding formula creates a shortfall in teachers' positions. In the past, and presently, the counties and local taxpayers have been funding the shortfall of teachers' positions, which cost in the millions of dollars in local tax money; and

**WHEREAS**, currently the formula for funding classroom teachers is based upon the number of teachers' positions times the average salary plus benefits for each school system. However, the school districts are not given the budgeted amount; they are given a monthly reimbursement for actual expenses and not enough to cover all positions required based upon the State determined student teacher ratio. The amount reimbursed is lower than the budgeted amounts for the teachers' positions; and

**WHEREAS**, the State could cover this shortfall of teachers' positions by applying the funding formula based upon individual schools and grades instead of only applying one total number for teachers' positions for the entire school district; and

**WHEREAS**, it appears that the money to cover this shortfall for teachers' positions is already budgeted for in the State's budget given the unencumbered money remaining after the actual reimbursed amounts are deducted from the budgeted amounts for teachers' positions; and

**WHEREAS**, if the State budgets for teachers' positions, then the State should pay all of the budgeted money necessary to fund these needed positions and not rely on the local taxpayer to cover the shortfall.

**NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the Gates County Board of Commissioners request the North Carolina General Assembly to make the necessary revisions to its funding formula to fund the needed teachers' positions in the local schools by applying the formula by individual schools and grades rather than one number for the entire school district and use the remaining unencumbered budgeted amount to pay for these needed positions, thereby relieving the local tax payer of this unnecessary burden of funding teachers' positions which are already budgeted for by the State.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Clerk to Board of Gates County Commissioners sends this Resolution to Governor Pat McCrory, Senate Leader Phil Berger, House Speaker Tim Moore and the Gates County Delegation.

Adopted this 1<sup>st</sup> day of July, 2015.

Commissioner Freeman made a motion to approve the Resolution Requesting the NC General Assembly to Change the Requisite Funding Formula to Increase the Number of Allotted Classroom Teachers' Positions by Applying the Formula to Individual Schools and Grades Rather than Districtwide and Fund These Positions by the Current Budget. Commissioner Felton seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Commissioner Owens recommended sharing the resolution with other counties in hope of increasing the number of resolutions submitted to legislatures.

Ms. Rountree stated there will be a public hearing at the next meeting to discuss the addition of an after-hours fee for Building & Fire Inspections. This is not a new fee but was mistakenly left off the Fees and Fines Ordinance. It has been approved and on the books since 2007, it is for contractors that request inspections on the weekends or after 5pm. Commissioner Jordan stated we would need to explain exactly which situations would warrant an after-hours fee and make sure it is clearly stated in the ordinance. Commissioner Owens verified there are scenarios where paying a fee to have an inspection conducted after-hours will benefit the contractor or developer. Commissioner Jordan would like to make sure we have a way of monitoring that staff is not scheduling after hours to receive overtime.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to hold a public hearing at the next meeting for the proposed After-Hours Fee Amendment to the Fees and Fines Ordinance. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Mike McAllister, MESCO, stated MESCO has looked at the tract on Cotton Gin Road and it looks much more promising than the previous tract that was reviewed. Based on preliminary findings it appears we may be able spray 30,000 to 50,000 gallons per day. The area in the option was a cleared area and some buffer areas will need to be secured and there are a variety of ways this can be done but the County will need to make sure they have control of the buffers. Some of the concerns would be a force main would have to be run from Honey Pot to Cotton Gin which increases the potential of odor and it causes a power issue.

Commissioner Jordan asked about a method to reduce the odor. Mr. McAllister explained the reason for the increased odor is because if the sewage sits for a long time as soon as it hits the spray field there is going to be an odor and the distance of the force main would lend to the waste sitting. One of the issues is when you have a pipe that turns on and off it allows the sewage to sit and create hydrogensulfite gas which is what you smell.

Commissioner Owens asked how far the treatment plant would be from a residence. Mr. McAllister said the treatment plant would be on the backside of the property as far away from a house as it could be.

Commissioner Felton asked what citizens would be of benefit besides Merchants Commerce. Commissioner Felton would like to see a public hearing held where citizens

could express their thoughts and hear all costs that would be incurred before the Board votes to move forward with any portion of the project. Commissioner Owens stated he would welcome a public hearing on the matter and feels that citizens will benefit from the businesses and services that it would allow to come. Citizens will benefit from the services they will be able to receive in the county and the business that can be done at home. Also it will help citizens share the tax burden with businesses. The County needs to hear all of the information and know that the Board is being transparent. The Board would like to correct some things that have happened in the past and make sure that citizens feel and know we are truly transparent. Commissioner Freeman would like to make sure that everyone is aware of the project and situation before it happens. Chair Hofler reiterated everyone is better off when everything is transparent. Commissioner Jordan stated transparency is important and a public hearing is to hear the concerns of citizens but it is not to determine the decision that the Board will make. It does not release the Board of doing their due diligence of making the best decisions for the county and if that decision needs to be made today it will happen after discussion in closed session. In order for us to truly know if the property is feasible the next phase of testing is needed and it is the responsibility of the Board to make that decision.

Ms. Rountree reminded the Board more specific questions relating to the property can be discussed in closed session but the rest of the discussion and vote needs to be in open session. Also remember there are grants, Golden Leaf, Commerce and EDA that needs to know our decision one way or the other so they can decide how to proceed with their funding. Ms. Rountree has spoken with an economic developer that works with the state who reiterated if we do not have a sewer system the chances of getting development in the county is going to fall by the wayside.

Mr. McAllister said he would be willing to come back and present to the public and answer questions.

Commissioner Jordan recommends the soil testing be conducted prior to a public hearing so the Board would have all information to present and be able to give a full picture of the project to the public.

Ms. Rountree reminded the Board the option on the land expires in September.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to authorize MESCO to complete the evaluation and testing of soil to determine the feasibility of submitting a report to NCDENR and preparing a final report for the Board outlining the project to present to citizens. Commissioner Owens seconded the motion; Commissioners Hofler, Owens, Jordan and Freeman voted in favor, Commissioner Felton voted in opposition. Motion carried four to one.

#### **New Business**

Ms. Rountree explained the Gates County Community Center would like to apply for the Play Together Grant for inclusive playground equipment. Since the equipment will be on county owned property a resolution in support of the grant and the equipment is needed.

Commissioner Felton read the following:

#### **RESOLUTION IN FAVOR OF GRANT APPLICATION FOR INCLUSIVE PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT**

A motion was made by \_\_\_\_\_ and seconded by \_\_\_\_\_ for the adoption of the following resolution, and upon being put to a vote was duly adopted.

WHEREAS, the Gates County Board of Commissioners is in full support of the Gates County Community Center applying for the East Carolina Behavioral Health Play Together Construction Grant, to provide funds to be used toward the purchase of inclusive playgrounds and/or playground equipment; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of these grant funds is to provide monies to The Gates County Community Center to improve playground space for children by adding playground equipment that is inclusive of all children; and

WHEREAS, the Gates County Board of Commissioners recognizes the importance of physical activity, outdoor recreation and social interaction for all children in Gates County; and

WHEREAS, all playground equipment funded by the Inclusive Playground Equipment Grant will be located on Gates County property; and

WHEREAS, The Gates County Community Center has responsibility for the administration of the grant including the necessary guidelines and procedure governing applications for funding assistance according to East Carolina Behavioral Health; and

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Gates County Board of Commissioners does hereby express its support for the East Carolina Behavioral Health Play Together Construction Grant application for inclusive playgrounds and/or playground equipment.

ADOPTED by the Gates County Board of Commissioners and signed by the Chairman of the Board this 1<sup>st</sup> day of July, 2015.

Commissioner Felton made a motion to approve the Resolution in Favor of the Play Together Grant Application for Inclusive Playground Equipment. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Jennifer Baptiste, Planning Director, presented a list of potential committee members for the CAMA Land Use Plan Steering Committee. Ms. Baptiste stated these are her recommendations and can be changed as the Board would like. At the last meeting it was determined there would be seven to nine voting committee members.

Chair Hofler feels the recommended Board is very bureaucratic and is heavily weighted with staff members and those that already sit on county boards. Commissioner Felton agreed and suggested a forestry representative and large land owning farmers to sit on the committee as well. Ms. Baptiste suggested the Board contact individuals or provide contact information for the Planning Office to make contact in a timely manner. Commissioner Jordan stated we will need to solicit citizens to complete an application to serve on the committee. Commissioner Jordan said he personally has a few names in mind but he doesn't know if they want or are willing to serve. Commissioner Hofler stated she would like to see that the committee is geographically represented. Ms. Baptiste would like to receive applications by the July 20<sup>th</sup> meeting. The Board discussed posting on the website and spreading the word so that applications can be received before July 20<sup>th</sup>.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to direct staff to advertise for the CAMA Land Use Steering Committee for applications to be submitted prior to July 20<sup>th</sup>. Commissioner Felton seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

The Board discussed the option of increasing the number of members from 9 to 11 and decided to leave the committee at 9 members for now and review again after applications have been received.

Jennifer Baptiste, County Planner, explained she and the Tax Administrator went to the Currituck County GIS Department to determine what direction we may need to go in. Their system is far more superior to our system and it will take us at least ten years to even catch up with where they are at now. They provided some valuable insight and suggestions on getting our system taken care of and we obtained some names and firms that they have worked with to set up their system. Ms. Baptiste asked if the Board would like to contact the companies that have been recommended or would they like a request for proposal to be sent out.

Commissioner Jordan asked how much we currently pay. Ms. Lane stated we pay \$7,200 annually for updates, this is a minimal cost. Ms. Baptiste stated before we can even begin to think about having a self-maintained system we need a company to come in and cleanup

the system in place. Commissioner Jordan asked about the licensure. Ms. Baptiste stated she has a software licensure to operate the program on her system but we would have to expand the licensure before we could maintain the entire system ourselves.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to authorize the County Planner to issue a request for proposal for updating the current GIS system. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Chair Hofler reiterated there have been a lot of discussions and meetings about the increase of solar farms and we need to discuss if we have our ordinance in place to accommodate the additions of solar farms to the county to make sure our citizens are protected.

Jennifer Baptiste, County Planner, stated solar farms are currently done through the special use permit process which requires an application be submitted, advertisements be placed and surrounding land owners be contacted before the public hearing is conducted. Ms. Rountree referenced section 7.2 Note 12 of the ordinance which addresses the buffers and setbacks required for solar farms. Ms. Baptiste said if the property is on a secondary road and adjoins a residential property the buffer is 50ft. With any special use permit the Board of Adjustment has the ability to add additional guidelines as they see fit. There is a hearing coming up where the Board of Adjustment is being recommended to add stream buffers since there is a stream that runs through the property. The Army Corps of Engineers must determine what type of stream it is so that we will know what type of stream buffers would be needed. Chair Hofler said there is a proposed solar farm for 1,500 acres which impacts residents, wildlife and other areas. We need to make sure we have everything in place to protect all citizens. Pasquotank and surrounding counties have been discussing the topic also. The majority of the land is being leased between 15 and 30 years and the panels typically lasts around 20 years before they must be replaced. Pasquotank states in their ordinance that the panels must be removed from the property. Chair Hofler asked if we have anything in place to protect citizens from being left with 1,000 acres of panels. Ms. Baptiste stated we currently do not have anything in our ordinance establishing these type of guidelines. When the special use permit is submitted they receive a copy of the section of the ordinance that states the required guidelines. Commissioner Owens stated when an individual is leasing and buying land they are going to have an attorney to guide them, we do not need to get into the business of providing advice. We need to create a solar farm document that is an ordinance to regulate solar farms.

The Board would like the Planning Director to create a draft ordinance to regulate abandoned solar farms to go before the Planning Board.

Commissioner Jordan stated Mr. Roger Van Smith contacted him about allowing the Gates County NC Church Ambassadors program to utilize the governmental information letter. Commissioner Jordan stated he presented the information to the County Manager and the County Manager has received recommendations that it is not appropriate to issue the governmental information letter to a subcommittee of the nursing home advisory committee. In the general statute the nursing home advisory committee is to promote the cooperation of citizens of the county to get involved in providing a good quality of life for nursing home residents through the church ambassadors program. The County Manager has also solicited the advice of the county attorney as well.

Ms. Rountree explained she has contacted the IRS and received a recommendation to not provide the IRS Governmental Determination Letter. While the Nursing Home Committee is a state entity and it doesn't receive funding the Church Ambassadors do not qualify as a direct governmental entity because they are not created by the State or the County. They are applying for a 501(c) 4 which typically the donations are not tax deductible. The County Attorney has written a letter concurring with the decision of the IRS.

Commissioner Jordan said paragraph A of General Statute 131E-138 says it is the purpose of the General Assembly that community advisory committees work to maintain the intent of the Part within the nursing homes in this State, including nursing homes operated by hospitals licensed under Article 5 of G.S. Chapter 131E. It is the further purpose of the General Assembly that the committees promote community involvement and cooperation with nursing home an integration of these homes into a system of care for the elderly. This is a charge given to the Nursing Home Advisory Committee to fill the requirements of the

general statute and to promote community involvement. There is no instruction on how to fulfill this charge and the creation of the Church Ambassadors Program would fulfill the charge. If it is not feasible for the organization to use the Governmental Determination Letter then we need to support the group by funding the costs of the group to receive the 501c (4) status which is around \$400. If the costs is split six ways then it would be about \$65 each. Commissioner Jordan asked the Board to consider providing a donation if we will not allow them to use the Governmental Determination Letter.

Roger Van Smith, Gates County NC Church Ambassadors Program, stated the Gates County NC Church Ambassadors Advisory Committee is created by the Board that has been appointed by the Board of Commissioners. The Secretary of the State approved the body as an instrument of Gates County Government under NC State Law. Mr. Smith said he is an attorney and begs to differ with the County Attorney. Once you read the statute the statute does not allow an instrument of government to be designated as a 501(c) 3. It is a social welfare organization and the purpose of the 501c (3) is to allow the organization to fulfill the governments purpose which is the protection and enhancement of the residents bill of rights. It allows organizations to give funding and allows the organization to seek grants. The ambassadors that are members come from the missionary outreach specified in the church gospel. The ambassadors reach into their own pockets and support the programs that enhance the quality of life for those that have to go into a nursing home or an adult assisted living. Mr. Smith said he disagrees with the letter submitted from the County Attorney but he has not received it to review it in great detail. There is nothing which states the Government does not allow a delegation which is appointed by the government to form an organization that is going to support the mission which is the enhancement and protection of the residents that reside at Down East and Gates House bill of rights. If you look at the IRS regulations they have all types of regulations which counter another regulation. Mr. Smith feels he has provided a rebuttal to each proposed issue and you will find that each rebuttal goes into more detail than his counterpart the County Attorney.

Commissioner Owens stated when we make decisions we have information presented. We have information from the IRS advising us to not use the tax id number and then the Attorney sends a letter stating the organization was not created by the County; it is being created by an advisory committee that the County did create. Commissioner Owens asked for verification that the Board did not appoint any member of the Church Ambassadors program. Ms. Rountree stated the general statute creates the Nursing Home Advisory Committee and the County has appointed individuals to serve on the committee. The individuals that serve on the committee have created the Gates County North Carolina Church Ambassadors program.

Commissioner Jordan gave some examples of the types of things that the Nursing Home Advisory Committee does that needs funding, donations, and grants. Commissioner Owens verified that the Church Ambassadors feels they will have better access to grants and would not pay sales tax if they have the letter. Vendors will waive the tax and often time donate items if the letter is present. Mr. Smith stated the committee would not have to pay tax on items purchased if they have access to the County letter.

Commissioner Freeman asked if the grants would be monitored and managed by the County. Mr. Smith stated the committee is mandated to provide a monthly report to the County. The government mandates that the organization operates as a non-profit and if the organization should ever dissolve then the Federal Government has the opportunity to take all assets that have been obtained. If the Federal Government does not take all of the assets the State has the option to take those assets. Items the organization purchases or is given is given to Down East or Gates House the organization has no need to have items or assets on hand.

Commissioner Owens stated he would feel better about making a decision once the Board can speak with Attorney Godwin who will be present at closed session.

Chair Hofler said the reading of the general statute is open for interpretation.

Chair Hofler feels if we do it for this group we will have other Boards that could come before the Board and request the use of the letter also. We have to consider what we are

setting ourselves up for down the road. The Ambassadors can operate and provide assistance without the County being involved in anyway. Mr. Smith stated the general statute does not directly state that the Church Ambassadors must be created but it also doesn't say it cannot be created. The individuals appointed felt creating this group was the best way to fulfil their requirements. Mr. Smith feels the CAC could submit the \$400 application fee to the County as an expense that was incurred through doing their business. There is no need for the County to spend this money when they have a letter that can be used. If you found that someone misused the letter they could be removed from the Board and even prosecuted.

Chair Hofler said when you have the IRS and an Attorney advising the Board then you need to listen to their advice. Mr. Smith said he is an attorney also and would advise the Board differently. Chair Hofler said he may advise differently because he is invested in the group. Mr. Smith says he receives no monetary benefits and is not biased toward the group he is only going to receive benefits from God.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to table the consideration of the use of the IRS Governmental Letter. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Ms. Rountree presented three recommendations to the Board to reorganize the Customer Service and Tax Office. The recommendations are:

Recommendation 1: Customer Service will become its own department separate from Financial Services. This will allow the Financial Services Department Head to spend more time handling the County's finances. The Customer Service Department would be comprised of the Customer Service Department Head, two Customer Service Representatives, and three Water Meter Readers.

Recommendation 2: The Customer Service Department will collect fees and fines for water, landfill, Developmental Services, Planning and Zoning, GITS, Department of Social Services, Cooperative Extension, Register of Deeds, and Sheriff's Department. The Department also will receive all funding that comes into Financial Services. Taxes will be collected by the Tax Department. Diane Hendrix and Kathy Lane are in agreement with this recommendation. Allowing the Tax Department to collect taxes will assist them in communicating with those that owe taxes. Each department head will oversee their respective staff to ensure transactions are being properly handled. There will be an interdepartmental agreement between Customer Service and Tax concerning assistance as needed between the two departments.

Recommendation 3: Change "Developmental Services Department" to "Inspections Department".

Commissioner Felton made a motion to approve the recommendations as presented.

Kathy Lane, Tax Administrator, echoed the County Managers recommendation except for the last sentence. If each department is fully staffed why would there need to be assistance from each department. The tax office is comfortable in the current space they have and it is a functional area.

Ms. Rountree stated payroll and finance share an office and have sensitive issues that are being overheard by citizens and finance staff is having to come in on the weekends to get work done that can't be completed because of the numerous interruptions that occur because offices are being shared.

Commissioner Owens asked Ms. Lane if her office space is adequate. Ms. Lane feels their current space is extremely adequate and the move would require construction cost in an already tight budget year where departments have taken cuts.

Chair Hofler verified that Ms. Lane would be willing to cooperate

Commissioner Jordan stated we are almost talking about two different agencies. The Board of Commissioners appoints a tax administrator to facilitate and run that department and we

must listen to the guidance that is provided. The customer service department was created to be a self-sufficient entity. Once upon a time there was a resignation given to the Board stating their space was not adequate.

Commissioner Felton rescinded his motion until more information can be received.

Commissioner Owens made a motion to table the motion until the July 20<sup>th</sup> meeting. Commissioner Jordan seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Chair Hofler stated the Board has received a letter from the Economic Improvement Council requesting permit fee for installing insulation be waived. Chair Hofler stated she has reached out to a surrounding county and was advised if the Board chooses to waive fees to not waive inspection.

Commissioner Jordan stated he is in favor of making a motion to approve the waiver of the fees since it is for services that benefit citizens of the county and by waiving fees we can help them stretch their funds further. Commissioner Jordan read the request letter received from Dr. Mason.

Commissioner Jordan made a motion to waive permit fees for the Economic Improvement Council for installation of insulation with the inspection to be conducted after installation. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

The Board discussed the process and paperwork that may need to be involved. The Board tasked the County Manager to work with Inspections Department to figure out the paperwork and procedure.

Commissioner Felton asked if we approve the fee waiver and our surrounding counties do not currently grant a fee waiver, are we putting them in an awkward situation. Commissioner Owens feels it will be up to the other counties to follow suit, someone always has to be first. The five permit fees is not going to break us but it allows over \$26,000 of work to be conducted for residents.

### **Citizen Comments**

Erin Eure, 345 Bosley Road, lives across from the proposed 1,500 solar farm project. Our ordinance needs to be strengthened to not only include the decommissioning plan but the required buffers as well. With a degree in horticulture Ms. Eure feels the buffers are inadequate to protect citizens. Strengthening the ordinance does take time but it needs to be done. The ordinance is vague and sometimes there is a need to be vague so you have some flexibility but this can also cause issues. When you say there needs to be a 50 foot planted buffer does this refer to grass, shrubbery or trees? It also mentions it must be along roadway frontage. Does this mean the Board feels that construction of the solar farm would only bother those on roadway frontage, what about the landowners on the surrounding sides of the land? The proposed project does not have roadway frontage but you can see it from three different roads. With the magnitude of the proposed project it will be clear cut and is in managed timber lands and will have animal displacement. If the proposed project is approved before the ordinance can be updated will the project be grandfathered in? Ms. Eure feels these types of issues can't be addressed in full detail during a Board of Adjustment meeting. Although the Board of Adjustment tries to do the best they can with the job they are tasked with when you go to a meeting there are representatives from the company and from concerned citizens but there is no one present that presents unbiased information. A solar farm that was already approved has run into major issues because they logged into wetlands. Are we enabling companies to make oops mistakes that can't be corrected? We need to put consideration into not only the decommissioning down the road but the protection of current citizens and buffers. The Board can reference the Cooperative Extension Office and other resources to determine plant uses and needs as well as other items that need to be put in place.

Commissioner Jordan said all of the requirements in a created ordinance may or may not be able to be retroactive. Chair Hofler said the Board of Adjustment is able to put conditions onto the developer with the issuance of the special use permit.

### **Commissioner Comments**

Chairman Hofler thanked citizens for attending and staying until the end. As we prepare to celebrate our nation's birthday I hope we pause and thank about those that have made sacrifices for us to be here today. We are not a perfect nation but we are striving to get better each and every day.

Commissioner Owens thanked citizens for attending we appreciate your participation and thank you Ms. Eure for bringing our attention to the solar farm issues.

Commissioner Jordan thanked citizens for attending and participating. We have had some lively discussions today and made some decisions that needed to be made today. He thanked the board for looking into the matters discussed and preparing for the meeting prior to the meeting. Thank you for trusting your Board to come together and make the decisions that need to be made.

Commissioner Felton thanked everyone for attending and reiterated Chair Hofler's comments about the Fourth of July. We often take our rights for granted, not everyone across the world can go into a courtroom and carry out the business of their community.

Commissioner Freeman thanked citizens for attending and stated we are all proud of the County and our citizens and the staff that carries out the counties work. Not everyone is fortunate enough to have the freedoms that we have. The phone calls we get are appreciated and we all agree our educational system and schools are important to all of us.

### **Closed Session**

Commissioner Owens made a motion to enter into closed session pursuant to NCGS 143-318.11 a (3) Legal, (4) Economic Development, (6) Personnel. Commissioner Jordan seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.

Commissioner Felton made a motion to exit closed session. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion carried without opposition.

### **Adjournment**

Commissioner Felton made a motion follow the recommendation of the IRS Representative and the County Attorney in accordance with the IRS Governmental Letter for the Church Ambassadors however alternative means will be considered. Commissioner Freeman seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Freeman made a motion to recess until July 20, 2015. Commissioner Jordan seconded the motion; motion passed without opposition.




