

**Gates County Board of Commissioners
Regular Meeting Minutes
April 7, 2008**

The Gates County Board of Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, April 7th, 2008, at 10:00 o'clock AM in the County Commissioners Room, 202 Court Street, Gatesville, NC. Commissioners Pierce, Askew, Jernigan, Rountree and Brown were present. Also present was County Manager Melinda Hoggard.

Chairman Pierce called the meeting to order.

Chairman Pierce read a thank you note from the family of Lois Boone.

CONSENT AGENDA: Commissioner Brown made a motion to approve the following:

- a) Minutes from the meeting of March 3, 2008.
- b) Minutes from the meeting of March 12, 2008.

Commissioner Askew seconded, motion carried.

County Manager, Melinda Hoggard discussed the corrections to the January 2008 minutes as requested by Mr. Buck. Discussion ensued regarding the request. Mr. Randy Cahoon, Director of Planning & Development Services gave further explanation.

Commissioner Brown made the motion to approve the minutes of the January 7th, 2008 meeting as they were originally submitted. Commissioner Askew abstained from voting due to a conflict. Commissioner Rountree seconded, motion carried with 4 Ayes.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT SERVICES: Mr. Cahoon reported that at a joint meeting it was decided that changes to the current ordinances needed to be discussed. Several phone calls have been received regarding the recommended changes. Mr. Cahoon clarified that the proposed changes do not pertain to garages and read the public hearing notice for clarification. He advised the Board of Commissioners to accept the ordinance as it has been written in order to define primary residence and that there should be one residential structure per lot. Commissioner Jernigan asked what happens to any existing structures. Mr. Cahoon stated that changes will only apply to new structures or changes to pre-existing structures.

PUBLIC HEARINGS REGARDING ZONING ORDINANCES:

Chairman Pierce opened the public hearing regarding Gates County Zoning Ordinance Section 12.03.

The following comments were received from the public.

Sharon Jones, 1084 Carters Road: Stated that citizens should be able to build on their land. Mr. Cahoon gave definition of a lot for clarification and explained how land can be divided to add a second residence.

Ben Lang, Gatesville: If something happened to him and his wife they might need to build an addition for assisted living. Mr. Cahoon stated there is no prohibition against building another room to an existing structure.

Paul Toti, Hobbsville: Can he build a garage with apartment? What is the current rule? Mr. Cahoon stated that under the current rule there can be only one primary residence on a lot. Mr. Toti stated he would like the right to be able to do so if he wished. Discussion ensued regarding differences between commercial

and residential rules; additions built on for private use, renting of second structure.

Fred Spivey, Sunbury: Asked about putting an apartment under his house. When he asked Dare County he was advised that he could add a bedroom and bath – all but a kitchen. The kitchen constituted a second residence.

Aaron Smith, Eure: Does this mean we can only have one residence per acre? He would like to ^{buy} right to build or rent if he wants.

Paulette Britt, Hobbsville: She asked for clarification on the difference between the Development Ordinance established in 1985 and the Zoning Ordinance. Mr. Cahoon stated that counties could elect to have both, and both can be in effect at the same time. Our current ordinances are conflicting at times.

Earl Rountree, 226 Folly Rd, Sunbury: Stated that there is a problem with the proposed changes and that the ordinances are not clear. He would like to see ordinances less vague – by way of example garage apartments. He noted that there is a man on Folly Road living in a garage, burning wood, and has a boat in the yard. Can that man not build a house on that lot? Mr. Cahoon clarified that the living quarters in the garage would have to be dismantled before he could get final approval on a new residence. Mr. Cahoon stated he came before board a few months ago with a copy of the Pasquotank County's ordinance that exempts families from subdivision regulations.

John Hora: What is the real objective? He has an existing garage that could easily be turned into living quarters. He wants to know why it would be a problem if he wanted to turn it into residence and rent it out? He has small farm and wants to divide into 4 acre lots, which would be a subdivision under new ordinance. What is the objective of the proposed ordinance? He cannot understand why when it is family involved it has to go thru subdivision regulations.

Mr. Cahoon clarified the definition of a subdivision as declared by NC Supreme Court, noting that there are state rules on subdivisions.

Dan Bazemore, Little Island Road, Eure: When we are discussing the 2 different ordinances it is his interpretation that it is the authority of the Board of Commissioners to change the ordinance. He agreed with Ms. Paulette Britt that the 2 current ordinances are contradictory

Chairman Pierce closed the Public Hearing at this time.

David Brown made a motion not to approve any changes to the ordinances at this time. Commissioner Askew seconded, motion carried.

Mr. Cahoon noted that this does not change the Development Ordinance that is currently in effect. The Planning Board will look at this in their May meeting.

Mr. Cahoon read the proposed changes regarding temporary housing in campers; hooking up to septic, etc. Mr. Cahoon gave an explanation of current laws. Commissioner Pierce asked about self-contained campers where wastewater is held in a tank and dumped at a waste station. Commissioner Jernigan stated that hunters stay in campers during hunting season and he has problem with the current wording. Mr. Cahoon stated that the issue is fugitive dumping and there are state regulations. Changes would allow the tracking of campers and assist the Health Department to control dumping. Extensions could be granted by the Board of Commissioners.

Chairman Pierce opened the Public Hearing regarding Zoning Ordinance Note 7.

Paul Toti, Hobbsville: What is the fine for dumping? Some stay in trailers to hunt and fish and provide income to Gates County, We should let the state fine control dumping, not our ordinance.

Arlin Smith, Eure: If a man wants to hook to a septic tank, is there a 6-month rule that he cannot live in the trailer? Can he have family stay in a camper on his lot legally right now? Is illegal dumping only a couple of cases? Mr. Cahoon responded that there were 13 incidences of regular illegal dumping in the County.

John Hora: A hurricane destroyed his office and he used a trailer as a temporary office. They used a temporary septic system, a portable septic system. Mr. Cahoon noted this is an allowable system. The Health Department approves septic systems.

Tommy Umphlett, Eure: People use holding tanks and regularly scheduled pumping. There are alternate ways of sewage disposal other than septic tanks.

Paul Toti, Hobbsville: The septic tank wording is confusing and maybe it should state that portable systems are allowable.

Lulu Eure: Stated that she is building a campground and is creating a dump station.

Milton Carter, 135 NC 32 South Cooper Loop: Asked what the problem is with staying in a trailer for more than 180 days. He currently dumps in a portable system and has been in his trailer since 2003. He is trying to build a house. It is an unfair law. What is difference between travel home and trailer other than size? Zoning recently changed in his area.

Discussion and clarification ensued regarding the 120-day limit for the replacement of trailers and mobile homes.

Earl Rountree, Sunbury: If a person has trailer in flood zone it cannot be replaced.

Mr. Cahoon clarified that they can be replaced but are subject to FEMA regulations that apply to structures in flood zone. Structures must be elevated.

Jernigan asked if we could strike under "180 days, not necessarily consecutive...."

Chairman Pierce closed the Public Hearing.

Mr. Cahoon clarified that the current ordinance gives the County a tracking system and a way to respond to public complaints. Commissioner Jernigan stated the ordinance was too restrictive but he would like tracking system. Commissioner Brown agreed that we need to have approved septic systems and eliminate the time restrictions. He noted that there are problems with the zoning ordinance and the Board will work on problems when they arise.

Commissioner Jernigan made a motion to table the matter. Commissioner Brown seconded, motion carried.

Mr. Cahoon stated that there is currently an overregulation of additions to existing buildings and proposes an increase from 10% to 50%. This provision applies to residential and commercial properties. He recommended the increase.

Chairman Pierce opened the public hearing regarding Zoning Ordinance Section 6.02.

Mr. Jordan, 21 Cooper Road: Good idea, and a positive change.

Chairman Pierce closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Brown made a motion to approve the change. Commissioner Jernigan seconded, motion carried.

PROJECT LIFE SAVER: Sheriff Webb recognized those involved in the implementation of the project. The project will make use of equipment and will be directed towards elderly and those diagnosed with Alzheimer's. The county requested and received the equipment through a grant. Sheriff Webb demonstrated the tracking box and explained how people will be screened. Once qualified, the person will receive a band to place on their wrist and that person can be tracked. He noted that it is a good program for elderly people with Alzheimer's. There will be a fee for program participation.

Colleen Turner stated that Paula Adolf and Phyllis Parker spearheaded the initiative and have put a lot of time and energy in the effort. Gates Partners for Health has earmarked \$4,200 in their budget to assist low-income families who are interested in this program.

DRIVING RECORD AND SYSTEM SAFETY PLANS FOR GITS: Ms. Patrice Lassiter requested approval of a change in the driving record policy for GITS. She read the current policy and stated she reviewed other agencies' policies. The new policy has been presented to her advisory board. Ms. Lassiter read proposed changes. Commissioner Jernigan is on the advisory board and noted that he worked with Patrice in regards to the changes.

Commissioner Jernigan made a motion to approve the changes to the driving record policy for GITS. Commissioner Askew seconded, motion carried.

Ms. Lassiter presented the Safety Plan to the Board. Its creation was prompted from the safety audit performed in November 2007. It is a conservative policy. The state requires that a plan be in place.

Commissioner Brown made a motion to approve the safety plan as presented. Commissioner Rountree seconded, motion carried.

RELOCATION OF GITS: Commissioner Jernigan stated that he would like to relocate GIS to the EIC building. However, another location has opened up this morning. A move will relieve GITS of \$850 rent, and utility costs and reduce overall costs and add to the program.

Board has no objections to the move.

Zoning: Mr. Tommy Umphlett asked for clarification of why his property is being zoned RMH-1. He stated that the previous County Manager agreed to approve the rezoning request and attach a \$25 fee. The issue has been on going for over a year. What is difference between R-1 and RMH-1? Commissioner Brown clarified that if there is a mobile home on the property that is lost, you have 120 days to replace, if zoned residential. R-1 is housing that meets NC housing code. RMH-1 meets HUD code, which is less restrictive than NC housing code. Mr. Umphlett states that a decision needs to be put in writing, as the issue has been ongoing for a year. He discussed the zoning map created by consultants. Mr. Cahoon stated there would be a general review of maps upcoming. Mr. Umphlett asked for clarification that he would be allowed to replace his homes under the current ordinance. Commissioner Brown responded that he could and Mr.

Cahoon confirmed under the ordinance as it stands now.

Mr. Henry Jordan stated that there are misunderstandings about the ordinance in general.

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS NIGHT MEETINGS DISCUSSION: Ms. Sharon Jones asked that the Board of Commissioners go to all night meetings so more people can attend. Commissioner Brown stated that night meetings are not convenient to all citizens. Chairman Pierce stated that we have better attendance at the morning meetings. Also, if meetings run 5 hours at night, meetings would run too late. For now, Board will continue to alternate meetings, day to night. Commissioner Askew visited other counties and noted that day meetings are more attended. Commissioner Jernigan stated that the Board visited each community and some meetings were not well attended while others were. The School of Government recommended there be a set schedule, with a set location.

BOARD OF EDUCATION BUDGET REQUEST: Mr. Leslie Byrum, Chairman of the Board of Education gave a brief overview of the 2008 – 2009 budget request. He stated that they did not receive any new money this year. The School Board had to take from fund balance last year and there is a minimum required amount to be in fund balance. There will be no raises included based on state recommendations. The staff has made changes to become more efficient using less heating supplies, less paper, etc. There will be no line item for an emergency fund, instead this will come from fund balance. Custodial positions have been added. They have not allocated for emergency funds that would cover replacement of heating systems, water pipes, etc. There is an overall decrease in capital outlay, appropriated from fund balance to cover some costs of construction.

The Board of Commisisoners convened for a short break.

Chairman called meeting back to order. Commissioner Rountree did not return.

COOPERATIVE EXTENSION APPOINTMENT WITH THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS: Ms. Reba Green-Holley presented a Certificate of Appreciation to the Commissioners for their continued support of the 4H program in Gates County.

Ms. Green-Holley invited the Commissioners to an appreciation luncheon hosted by Gates Cooperative Extension Service, to be held the 1st Monday in August, following the board meeting

An application was previously submitted requesting Reid's Grove School to be on the study list for the National Register. A letter has been received stating that the property has potential to be put on register and will be added to the study list. The first step in the process is to provide a written research study. During this time there cannot be any changes made to the building that would alter it's historical value.

Chairman Pierce asked what the report needed to include. Ms. Green-Holley stated that the study is done locally and there is a consultant that will help with no charge.

Commissioner Jernigan made a motion to move forward with the study. Commissioner Askew seconded, motion carried.

LITTERING ON COUNTY PROPERTY: Mr. Curtis Meads asked that there be a designated smoking area at county buildings. There are a lot of elderly, and people with oxygen tanks that enter the building. People smoking at the doors create a hazard to their health since they have to walk through the smoke. This will also help control littering. Commissioner Jernigan stated there is a non-

smoking policy for the building and he would like to extend that to the grounds of county buildings. Mr. Meads recommended the smoking area be located at side door beside the Sheriff's Department.

Commissioner Jernigan made the motion to designate the door by Sheriff's department be the smoking area, and to place signage and a proper disposal stand in the area. Commissioner Askew seconded.

Commissioner Brown asked that other county buildings be addressed. Commissioner Jernigan stated that library, Cooperative Extension Service, Social Services also designate a smoking area.

Jernigan withdrew his motion pending County Manager's review of School of Government's recommendations and regulations.

Mr. Meads asked if we could fine people for littering and enforce the fine. County Manager will research the matter.

ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCE: Sheriff Webb has reviewed copies of other Counties' ordinances in order to update the Gates County Animal Control Ordinance. Having the sheriff department enforce the animal control ordinance is becoming the norm across the state. The final draft is not yet ready for review. Sheriff Webb will try to have before the next Board of Commissioners' meeting. The ordinance will address all breeds and types of animals.

CHILD ABUSE AND NEGLECT PREVENTION AND AWARENESS MONTH: Ms. Colleen Turner brought samples of marketing materials that will be distributed throughout the County this month. April has been designated Child Abuse and Neglect Awareness Month and is nationally recognized. The Blue Ribbon Campaign is designed to remember those who have been affected by child abuse. All marketing materials display the phone number and contact information to report abuse. There is a social worker on call 24 hours a day to respond to calls or reports of neglect and abuse. The Gates County Index will run stories this month. Last year Gates County had 145 reports, 25% were investigated and found to be in need of services. Our statistics are close to state averages. Gates County residents do lack knowledge of services available.

Also, Federal Medicaid is being reviewed and include possible cuts to non-emergency travel funds. We will either have to cut the services or provide them at county costs.

Commissioner Brown stated that he recently attended a meeting with Joann Lamm and she spoke very highly of Gates County Social Services.

Gates County does have some foster parents and some children staying with relatives. The foster parent program can be costly.

FORESTRY SERVICE TRACTOR AND FIRST CALL SYSTEM: Mr. Billy Wynn, Emergency Management Director stated this year's forest fires have been excessive. Mr. Scott Sheets, County Ranger was present. They requested that Gates County ask for legislative approval to add a forestry tractor operator position. Currently Gates County shares a tractor with Hertford County. Gates County gets assistance from other counties when the shared tractor is not available, which is regularly. They gave a description of how the use of a tractor helps fight fires. Mr. Wynn gave a list of fires in Gates County this year. He asked for a decision to move forward and pursue the needed position. Mr. Wynn stated the process would take 1 – 2 years. Mr. Sheets stated there is an overall shortage of tractors in the district already which in turn limits response times when having to wait for use of tractor from other Counties. The equipment is also used for controlled burns, creation of fire lines, hazard reduction burns and other preventative and maintenance operations.

Commissioner Brown stated that he would like to see what this year's budget looks like before he makes a decision. Ms. Melinda Hoggard stated that the request would not impact this year's budget. Mr. Sheets confirmed that it would take a couple of years before Gates County would recognize the cost which would be around \$15,000.00.

Commissioner Jernigan stated that Camden county residents lost \$3 million in the Presidents Day fires. Mr. Sheets stated he has seen a need for the tractor and there are enough fires per year that require the use of a tractor to substantiate a need.

Chairman Pierce stated the issue would be considered.

Mr. Billy Wynn has looked into a Reverse 911 package at the request of the Board. Reverse 911 is the name of an actual product and is similar to the system used in our schools. A personalized message can be sent out to citizens according to set filters. First 911 is one of the products Mr. Wynn looked at. Hurricane Isabel brought our communications deficiency to the forefront – recognizing the need to better communication. Connect CTY is the complete package. Our school system uses Connect ED, made by the same company. Mr. Wynn gave details and a description of the package. He compared the 2 programs and gave list of incidences/events when the system could be used.

COUNTY CONVENIENCE SITE USAGE: Ms. Melinda Hoggard, at the request of the Board gave a report on the Gates County Convenience Sites being used by out of state residents. She stated that the problem was not out of state residents using the sites but instead, with people registering their vehicles in Virginia instead of Gates County.

Commissioner Brown stated that he has brought this issue before the Board before. He stated there needs to be a system of monitoring vehicle registration in Gates County and enacting a "voucher" system has been discussed. Vehicles not registered are a loss of revenue to Gates County. Last time the issue was raised research showed about 400 vehicles illegally registered or not registered in Gates County. Commissioner Askew asked for clarification on the length of time allowed to register your vehicle when you change states. A focused campaign would be needed to enforce the registration issues.

PERSONNEL POLICY FOR USAGE OF COUNTY VEHICLES: County Manager, Melinda Hoggard presented an amendment to the personnel policy regulating the usage of County vehicles. A public hearing will be scheduled for the next night meeting, which is May 19th at 7PM.

CDBG SCATTERED SITE GRANT: The Board needs to set a public hearing for the May meeting for the purposes of the upcoming CDBG Scattered Site Grant.

Commissioner Jernigan made motion to hold public hearing at the May 5th Commissioners Meeting. Commissioner Askew seconded, motion carried.

ALBEMARLE COMMISSION FUNDING REQUEST: The Albemarle Commission is requesting funding for Albemarle Senior Games. Ms. Colleen Turner stated that Gates County will send a group of seniors to the games this year and will have an ambassador in attendance.

Commissioner Jernigan made motion to give \$200 to the Albemarle Commission in support of the Senior Games. Commissioner Askew seconded, motion carried.

ALBEMARLE REGIONAL LIBRARY BOARD APPOINTMENTS: The Albemarle Regional Library asked the Board to reappoint Mr. Glenn Bunch and Ms. Renee Kittrell as Gates County Library Trustees.

Commissioner Brown made a motion to appoint the recommended people to the Library Board. Commissioner Jernigan seconded, motion carried.

RESOLUTION REQUESTING SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING FOR STREAM CLEAN-UP PROJECT: Gates County received funding from this fund after Hurricane Isabel.

Commissioner Jernigan made motion to pursue the funding. Commissioner Askew seconded, motion carried.

PROPOSED REGULATIONS FOR COASTAL CAMA COUNTIES: Mr. Paul Spruill, Beaufort County Manager sent a memorandum discussing concerns over newly proposed regulations for Coastal CAMA counties. These added storm water requirements will have a negative impact on our development in Gates County and add considerable costs to building. Mr. Spruill is willing to come to the meeting to discuss.

Commissioner Askew made a motion to contact legislation regarding Gates County's opposition to the proposed regulations. Commissioner Jernigan seconded, motion carried.

APPROVAL OF SCHEDULE B LICENSE FEES: Commissioner Jernigan made a motion to approve the Schedule B License Fees. Commissioner Askew seconded, motion carried.

BUDGET AMENDMENTS: Ms. Sandy Pittman, Finance Officer presented Budget Amendments 53 through 61.

Commissioner Jernigan made a motion to approve the budget amendments as presented. Commissioner Askew seconded, motion carried.

APPROVAL OF APPLICATION TO RECEIVE LOTTERY FUNDS FOR PAYMENT OF SCHOOL DEBT SERVICE: Ms. Melinda Hoggard stated this will be for current fiscal year and for next fiscal year. Commissioner Brown made a motion to approve the application. Commissioner Jernigan seconded, motion carried.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT SERVICES: Mr. Cahoon gave report on vacant lots in Gates County. He stated that the system is in place and it works well.

Mr. Cahoon asked to change the May 5th public hearing to May 19th night meeting. Mr. Cahoon gave explanation of Planning Board's recommendations and stated that the Planning Board does want to ban shared driveways.

Commissioner Brown made a motion to hold a public hearing regarding changes to the Zoning Ordinance at the May 19th Commissioners Meeting. Commissioner Askew seconded, motion carried.

Mr. Cahoon needs people to serve on the Board of Adjustment and Planning Boards. He asked the Board of Commissioners to recommend a list of potential appointees.

LATE APPEARANCES:

Commissioner Jernigan asked to discuss the upcoming OLF meeting. It is his understanding that the public will not be allowed to speak. All questions need to be forwarded to County Manager's office ahead of time to create the list of questions to ask. The meeting is to be held May 2nd and no time has been announced as of yet. Commissioner Jernigan asked the County Manager to

contact citizens groups and get the information out to the public about questions being allowed.

Commissioner Brown stated that he was under the impression that the Hwy 13 widening project was a top priority but just learned that it is not. Discussion ensued regarding DOT projects in Gates County.

CLOSED SESSION: Commissioner Jernigan made motion to go into closed session according to G.S. 143-318.11(a)(3) and G.S. 143-318.11(a)(6). Commissioner Askew seconded, motion carried.

Commissioner Askew made a motion to come out of closed session. Commissioner Jernigan seconded, motion carried.
